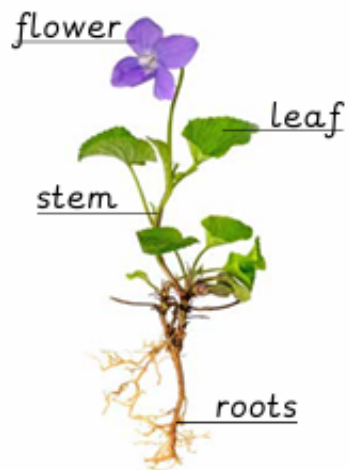


Plant parts



plant	A living thing that stays in one place and makes its own food from sunlight.
roots	The part of a plant that grows underground.
stem	The part of a plant that grows above ground and keeps the plant upright.
leaf	The green parts of a plant that grow from stems or branches.
flower	The colourful part of a plant where seeds are made.

Health and Wellbeing

Who helps us to keep safe?

Children will learn:

- that people have different roles in the community to help them (and others) keep safe - the jobs they do and how they help people
- who can help them in different places and situations; how to attract someone's attention or ask for help; what to say
- how to respond safely to adults they don't know
- what to do if they feel unsafe or worried for themselves or others; and the importance of keeping on asking for support until they are heard
- how to get help if there is an accident and someone is hurt, including how to dial 999 in an emergency and what to say

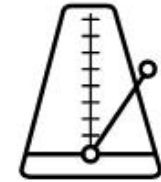


high

Near or at the top of the range of sounds.

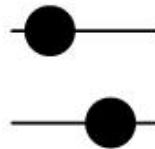
tempo
