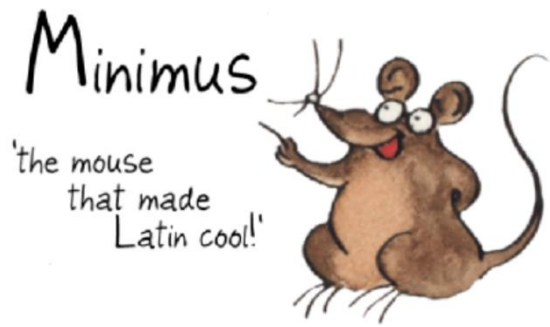

Grasp the Grammar - Consolidation

In this chapter, we will consolidate our grammatical learning by translating sentences that involve the grammatical concepts outlined below. If you need a reminder of these concepts, don't forget to check out your previous knowledge organisers.

- Personal pronouns – **Ego** sum calida (I am clever)
- Singular imperatives – Ecce! (Look!)
- Plural imperatives – vēnite! (Come!)
- Negative imperatives – nōlī tangere! (Don't touch)
- Impersonal verbs – semper pluit (It's always raining)
- infinitives – liberare (to set free)
- Compound verbs – subsum (I am under)
- Imperfect tense verbs - nāvīgābant (They were sailing)
